Is it possible that Epiphany might come first? Could the revelation of Christ among us come before the manifestation of Christ among us? I ask because I believe I have had such an experience. As we embark upon Advent and the great celebration of Jesus' birth, an 'aha' moment has led me into a deeper understanding of what it means to be a covenant member of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in NC, and how this Regional connection impacts my life daily. "What do you mean, Valerie?" I am glad you asked.

When I came to serve the region, my immersion into this branch of the Disciples of Christ tradition brought both cultural and theological surprise. Much of the theology was synonymous with the Church of Christ, Disciples of Christ, but there were some distinct differences. While I tried to steady myself in this new flow of Biblical and cultural traditions. I sometimes felt like the wisemen who asked "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." The wisemen made the journey from the East because they sought a connection between what they knew and what was yet to be revealed to them. The star they saw was so bright, so brilliant, until they knew something unusual was happening somewhere, and it would not be found by stargazing in their own backyard. They had to go and look for it! On the journey, their encounter with the culture and religion of Jerusalem eventually led them to the Messiah. But along the way, they also experienced smaller epiphanies. Me too.

In reflection, it was my immersion into this new, challenging and mysterious way of seeing things that transformed my thinking, opening me up to the revelation of who God might be beyond my limited understanding. It was in answering the call to serve Disciples Women, to serve as the Church of Christ liaison, to serve on the Commission on Ministry, and as the Search and Call contact person, where I saw the light of diversity and the power of the Table. In each of these areas of ministry, I began to understand how each Disciple is free to receive Scripture as Christ reveals and each one is celebrated for being their authentic self. Love and respect were revealed to me

through strength and diversity. In this church, the light of epiphany opened up, showing me the great liberty (and protection) experienced when there is a balance of power and the Body of Christ leads together.

This epiphany illuminated for me the strength of our regional anatomy. Like the human bloodstream, when districts are healthy, their congregations receive information on a regular basis, fellowship, study, engage service projects and worship together. There is a fulfillment of the covenant and a reciprocation of accountability and responsibility. When the full region assembles, the voice of the church speaks to the ills of society with conviction and hope. Our presence lifts the down-trodden and comforts the broken-hearted. We engage relevant programs and resources to meet spiritual and human needs. We dream God's future and put forth our best gifts.

One of my latest epiphanies has involved watching our Regional staff work beyond their pay grade and perform beyond their job descriptions. I have also witnessed the love of churches who remain connected to the region even during tough times. They continue to give financial support and pray for new direction. They do so not because it is convenient, but because they believe in the power of covenant. Our covenant has resulted in ordinations, commissions, installations, the growth of our camp and conference attendance and a statewide recovery initiative after Hurricane Florence. The truth is, you, Disciples of Christ in North Carolina, have been an epiphany to me! I have seen the light of our Savior in all of your faces, and while we wait upon the full manifestation of Christ in our region, may we all follow the one whose love is perfectly manifested to us in this season.

# The Christmas Offering Appeal

The first 180 days sped along at a quick pace. I am extremely hopeful in God's abundance as I witness grace and resilience around the region. There are three priorities framing my first year: 1) touching each and every congregation of the region in some way to renew our covenantal relationship and to help congregations do what they cannot do alone, 2) updating technological communications to disseminate regular and relevant information that offers life-affirming opportunities, and 3) providing financial transparency with strategic planning for our emerging reality. The third priority is the basis for this appeal.

We are very grateful for the donations that we have received in the first 10 months of 2018! A region cannot exist without the financial support of the congregations within its boundaries. As noted elsewhere in this newsletter, 84 of 124 congregations have contributed to sustaining the ministry of the region through the third quarter of 2018. That is great news! But please allow me to give you a financial snapshot of where we stand presently:

You can see from the numbers above, however, that we are in need of additional donations in 2018, as we have spent \$116,214 more than we have received in the current year. And we came into this year with an accumulated loss from prior years of \$90K. This shortfall is possible through board authorized "borrowing" from funds which the board has previously designated to be held for the future. But those funds are limited. We are required to protect all monies given to us with donor restrictions placed on them. That is, we **cannot** "borrow" from DWM/CWF funds, from funds given for projects at the camp, from funds given for youth programming, etc.

The Executive Committee and Board continue to seek new ways to keep costs down and to find new sources of income. Cost saving moves include the sale of the office building in 2017 and the elimination of the position of Associate Regional Minister as of 2019. To increase income, we are applying for a FEMA grant to help with the costs of the damage to Camp Caroline from Hurricane Florence, and we are monitoring usage fees at the camp, raising fees where possible while always mindful that the camp is a ministry. But these actions are not sufficient to resolve our financial concerns. Bottom line: we need your help! Please consider prayerfully what you and your congregation can give to the Christmas offering to sustain the ministry of the Christian Church in North Carolina.

The theme of the 2018 Christmas Offering is "Come they told Me." Our finest gifts support the work of regional ministries in North Carolina to connect congregations and foster faith development, gather Disciples in camps, conferences, and assemblies, nurture the development of a new generation of pastors, assist churches in calling new ministers, interpret the global mission of the Church, represent the Church in ecumenical gatherings, counsel and pray with those who are troubled of spirit, lead the Church to address racism, inspire leaders to experiment and create, and witness to the power of God to make things new. Come, let is bring our finest gifts to God in support of our region.

The NC COM also renewed many ministers' commissioning certificates, took other new candidates "under care," and provided care and support to other ministers. We also provided training to candidates about the call to ministry and Boundaries training to candidates and ministers. We supported the Racial Equity training. We launched "Covenant Partnerships," which is a mentoring peer program for new clergy.

If you are a commissioned minister in NC, but you have not been to the Commission on Ministry in the past two years, please call the Regional office to ensure we have your correct contact information. We remind commissioned ministers to send an annual report to the COM even if you have not been invited to a COM meeting; mail it to the region's PO Box, please. We offer these reminders to all clergy: the Region needs your current address, primary telephone number, and email address; renew Boundaries every five years, and renew Racial Equity every three years.

The Commission on Ministry appreciates churches who hosted us during 2018, including Wendell Christian Church in January, Rocky Fork CC in March, Wilson's Mills CC in May, FCC Wilson in July, Chapel Hill CC in September, and St. James Christian Church in Wilson in November. Your generous donation of space helped

many COM members and area candidates save fuel and the environment. Thank you!

# Living into Reconciliation-Covenant CC and St. Paul's Journey Together!

In August of 2018, St. Paul's Christian Church and Covenant Christian Church gathered at Camp Caroline for a weekend retreat, which included worship, learning, fun and relaxation. Rev. Diane Faires and Rev. Chris Furr worked together to develop the theme, which was: Prepare the Way: Becoming an Inclusive Church. The hope was that each congregation could gain awareness about ways the established culture of our churches can be exclusive of particular populations, and acquire tools for re-configuring those systems and distributing power to all members of the community. St. Paul's has a number of Montagnard families that form a vital part of the church's life; Covenant is becoming increasingly racially diverse. Often, we have blind spots in the way we structure our life together that unintentionally leaves some out. We wanted to learn more about that.

Rev. Jason Williams, one of our region's pastors and anti-racism trainers, agreed to be our keynote speaker. He began the sessions with a story about his own experience living in intentional community, and the assumptions he and his fellow housemates made in a situation fraught with racial tension. This scenario served as a lens for the weekend's sessions. "What does

inclusion really mean?" he asked us. Jason helped us to see that inclusion means sharing power with others, especially to make decisions that affect them and the community at large. Often we make assumptions about what is best for others without working collaboratively and involving them in the decision-making process.

Inclusion, he told us, begins with listening. If we can't hear each other, we can't begin to understand. Rev. Williams led us through exercises on how to be an active listener, which included guidance on how to listen for understanding. We also discussed how to



sponses when we are hearing things that are difficult for us to process. This is vital work for understanding the worldview of someone who comes from a different background.



The second session discussed power; who has power within our broader communities, and how it is shared, or withheld as the case may be. As congregations, we must be about this power analysis in our larger communities and within our congregations. Who holds power in our churches? How easy is it for newer people to have their voices heard? How do we raise up new leadership, instead of having the same small group of people holding the organizational power? We tend to think of power in negative terms,

but power is the ability to affect change. If we want everyone in our communities to have a voice and be truly inclusive, we must be willing to share power, especially in ways that may challenge the norms we have established in our communities.

In our final session, Jason divided the two churches in separate halves of the room, and asked us to break into small groups within our church groups. He then asked us to think about

a program in the life of our congregation or the community and evaluate it with the tools we had acquired over the weekend. Did we have an outreach program that wasn't as inclusive as it could be? What about our worship services? What are ways we could give others power and agency over their own lives and the help they were receiving?

For example, the youth from Covenant discussed a project they had participated in, which involved serving the homeless in downtown Raleigh. As they discussed, they realized that those they were serving had little choice in what they received--that they hadn't taken dietary restrictions into account, didn't provide any options for preference, etc. They began to brainstorm ways this project could be re-imagined to be more inclusive of those they served.

In closing, each congregation still has important work to do for understanding what it means to be fully inclusive, active in listening, and vigilant in analyzing the power structures in our churches' mission, education, worship and fellowship. We give God thanks for the Spirit that was present as we gathered, and for the tools available to us within our region to do this important work together.

#### **HURRICANE UPDATE**

Thank You North Carolina!! The response from our churches for those affected by Hurricane Florence has been humbling and amazing. Our task force put out pleas for Church World Service kits and you responded! We have been able to deliver: 357 Hygiene Kits, 360 Cleanup Bucket Kits, and up to



this time 785 School Kits. Not to mention the many volunteers who showed up and continue to show up at Camp Caroline to put our campground back together. Your love and support are being felt by many across our state.

Not only have you supplied kits, but you and Disciples throughout the general church have been generous with gifts to Week of Compassion. At the time of this writing, Week of Compassion (WOC) has given over \$49,000.00 in the aftermath of Florence. WOC funds have been provided to Disciple households, Disciple Congregations and to partner support. We are a thankful people.

However, the work of recovery is not over; it is only beginning. Our Disaster Response Task Force in partnership with WOC and Disciples Volunteering is hard at work planning for the next steps in recovery. We know many of you are tied up and worn down by the endless paper work. We are working on ways to provide you with human resources who can help you with the paper process. Very soon, we will be soliciting the names of persons within our congregations who have skills they are willing to donate in helping to navigate the paper trail. Additionally, we know this is a long term recovery of several years, not months. With Disciples Volunteering we are exploring ways we can be a part of the long term recovery effort through hosting work teams from both within and beyond our own region.

We are also aware there are damages just now being discovered and families who we are just now learning were affected. It is NEVER too late for you to let us know about a family or damaged facility. If you know of a need that has not yet been reported, please inform us. We are so thankful for our North Carolina Region Disciples. You are a compassionate people. Thanks be to God.

Dear NC Disciples Women:

We are delighted to share with you the 2019 Woman-to-Woman Scholarship Application, along with two Recommendation Forms. If you have an interest in being the North Carolina Woman-to-Woman representative to <u>MOROCCO in October</u>, please fill out the appropriate forms and return them to the Regional Office no later than <u>January 11<sup>th</sup></u> so that we might select the NC delegate and forward our recommendation to Indianapolis by **February 15<sup>th</sup>**. A member of the regional Woman-to-Woman committee or a previous Woman-to-Woman delegate is available to talk with each applicant personally to insure understanding of the covenant agreement in regard to international travels.

To complete the application process, read the guidelines for travel very carefully (access at www.discipleswomen.org) then give one of the Recommendation Forms to your <u>current</u> minister and one to a colleague. Advise them to return the form promptly. <u>January 11<sup>th</sup></u> is the deadline. The number of women allowed on the trip abroad is usually limited, so the sooner we receive your application and recommendations, the sooner we can choose a representative and pass that name on to the Office of Disciples Women in Indianapolis. Please do not send an application to the ODW without going through the NC process first, they will send it back to us!

The approximate cost for the trip is <u>\$5,000.00</u> (not including personal airfare to/from city of departure). Your NC DWM/CWF works to fund this trip, the applicant chosen is encouraged to raise funds as well. Local congregations and mission-minded organizations are always willing to help underwrite the trip. Some Woman-to-Woman delegates in the past have not had the money for such a trip but through the kindness of others, God made the way possible for them to travel. Go ahead and apply, you might end up with two stories to tell; 1) about the amazing benevolence of God and, 2) about how trust and faith are key ingredients for a miracle.

After the trip, you will be asked to fulfill your part of the Woman-to-Woman covenant agreement, which is to prepare and present a program to churches in the Region of North Carolina. These presentations will begin <u>April of the year following your travels</u>. This is traditionally when the DWM/CWF study material will include the country you visited as its mission emphasis. We will publish your logistical information throughout the region and the DWM/CWF's will contact you to arrange a time for a presentation. We highly encourage the churches to provide you with a place to stay if an overnight stay is necessary and pay your mileage at the CPI approved rate. When honorariums are given, they are remitted to the Regional office to replenish the Woman-to-Woman travel fund which will offer another woman an opportunity such as yours.

According to our former Woman-to-Woman representatives, experiencing Christianity in another culture is life-changing. Please give this your prayerful consideration.

#### Application Timeline from the Office of Disciples Women:

February 15 - Application is due.

March 1 - Notice of Acceptance to participants and regional staff.

May 1 - Deposit of \$600 and 2 copies of pages 1 & 2 of Passport due.

**June 1** - 1/3 of balance of the registration fee is due and deposit is non-refundable.

Cancellations after this point are subject to airfare and hotel cancellation penalties.

**July 15** – 1/2 of remaining balance of the registration fee is due.

August 15 – the balance of the registration fee is due.

\*\*Due to the necessity of spending funds well before journey begins,

the balance must be paid by August 15 or we will need to remove you from the list of participants.\*\*
