Luke 2:1-7 New International Version (NIV)

In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world.² (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.)³ And everyone went to their own town to register.



⁴ So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David.
⁵ He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. ⁶ While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born,
⁷ and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

This Advent Season I have been thinking a lot about Mary and Joseph. What a lousy time for Caesar Augustus to decree a census! Poor Mary was 9 months pregnant, but circumstances demanded she leave her home and go to be counted. Of course, as luck would have it, Mary went into labor! Away from the comforts and familiarity of her own home, away from friends and relatives to give her support and lend a helping hand, Mary gave birth to Jesus. I feel certain, Mary would have preferred to be in her own home town, in a place she loved, surrounded by friends and family. But the love of God could not wait for all to be perfect and right. The love of God came barreling into the world inside a stable in Bethlehem because all the Inns were full, and the child bearer was displaced.

This Christmas, in North Carolina, we still have so many families who are displaced from their homes and their communities. Additionally, we have congregations who cannot worship in their own facilities and they do not know when they will be able to return. It may be tempting to write this off as the worst Christmas ever! But it is in times exactly like these that God comes barreling into our world to bring us hope and courage for the journey. God has touched our lives through the outpouring of generosity and compassion. God is with us and with those who are displaced speaking a word of promise and joy. Emmanuel, God with Us. This year, may you be blessed by the Christ Child who comes into our midst at the very moments when we are the most vulnerable and the most in need.
