As a P.K. (preacher's kid) I did not grow up very familiar with sickness and its paramour, death. I was immersed in church life but was not acquainted with the process and impact of either. The vitality of life was what I knew, and then my uncle Clifton died! He was the heart of all the children in our family. He played with us and taught us Scripture. He was our up-close-and-personal adult example of Christian living and God's unconditional love.

So, what happened? How could the God whom Clifton described as loving humanity more than life itself, allow my uncle to die? This depth of pain could not be explained with words; just let me say, death hurts!

While preparing for his celebration, something unusual happened. Psalm 116 was mentioned as one of Clifton's favorite texts and as it was read aloud, the teaching and love we learned from my uncle ignited within me. I calmed down as I remembered that even during the transition from earth to heaven, God's love is still present with his beloved! God cared for my uncle while he was transitioning to his rest. And realiz-

ing how much we enjoyed him, God was and is also with us to heal the pain and to show us how to live with memories that replace Uncle Clifton's physical presence.

When Jesus gave his life for a fallen world, God was silent and yes, heartbroken, but he was also present and loving. With compassion, God created a platform of memories for the world to remember Jesus, even after His death, resurrection, and ascension. God through Jesus showed us how to live on while we wait to see him again!

The lesson I have learned is that God is deeply concerned when one of his beloved people faces transition and for those who remain. In response, I will keep my promise when I gather with the people of God. I will offer praise for the transcendent love of God! May God be praised!

The above summary of the operational accounts of the Region shows that expenditures exceeded income by not quite \$29K during January. Note, however, that this is to be expected in January, when Camp Caroline has little income. The Camp expenses of \$28K include a \$15K insurance bill due in January, salaries for year-round staff, and utilities necessary for improvements, repairs, and maintenance work to be done.



CUBA - Woman to Woman 2018

Dear Disciples of Christ in North Carolina,

What an honor and a privilege to be chosen as the North Carolina Christian Church Disciples Women's Ministries Woman to Woman delegate for 2018. During the last two weeks of October 2018 I joined a group of women from around the country along with Global Ministries staff to visit the beautiful island country of Cuba.

Upon our arrival, we were greeted with the warm tropical breeze and the warmth of the people who call the island home. We checked into our lodging at a beautiful old convent and greeted with a mural of our Lord and his apostles helping us to feel right at home!

Our eleven-day stay was filled with meeting other Christians who, though they are not Disciples, they offered nothing less than Christlike hospitality showering us with delicious food, great conversation through our interpreter and delightful music and laughter. We saw firsthand the devastating effects of the embargo that has been in place for many years. Despite having very little means, the people of the country showed true Abrahamic spirit in offering their best to us.

While we mostly stayed in the Havana area, we did journey out to other parts of the country to visit a Seminary with very austere accommodations, there again we were shown a generous outpouring of love and hospitality. It was here that we were treated to a wonderful performance of a choir of young people who sang with such beauty I experienced chills! Upon our departure from the Seminary we were surprised with a visit to the beach.

Other places we visited included the Cuban Council of Churches to meet with the government's Secretary of Religious Affairs. She was fascinating. We also met with the Director of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Community Center that has outreach programs to help the entire community. One of the programs which came about from here is a women's support group for survivors of domestic violence.

Another church service in which we participated was the First Presbyterian Church of Havana. It

was here that we were thrilled to hear two different African Choir groups perform as well as witness a praise dance troupe who rekindled my fond memories of my dance while I attended seminary.

Of course, we also enjoyed a tour of Old Havana and saw many of the automobiles that date back to the 50's and 60's in mint condition. The entire experience left me with a deep desire to return to visit all those who became instant friends and fellow worshippers of our mighty God. It also instilled in

me an even greater appreciation of Jesus' command to go out into all the world and make disciples! I have traveled extensively but when you travel with the purpose of sharing the love of Christ with others it takes on a whole new meaning! I am so grateful to have had this opportunity!

Our group elected to support the Seminary as well as the domestic violence survivor's group. I would love to come share more with your church and show you how you can help too! Invite Rev. Abby

As two important tasks, the NC Commission on Ministry works with candidates for either commissioned or ordained ministry and regularly renews commissioned ministers.

Candidates for Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) ministry include:

- Lay ministers whose churches (and senior pastor if applicable) have requested that the COM help them become Commissioned Ministers (formerly known as Licensed Ministers)
- Apprentice Track/"16 Competencies"/Ministerial Certificate students who seek ordination on the Apprentice track
- Master of Divinity (M. Div.) students who seek ordination on the M. Div. track
- M. Div. graduates who have not yet sought ordination
- Ordained ministers with a completed M. Div. degree who seek Disciples "standing" as they transfer in from another denomination

Note: The COM recognizes Master of Divinity degrees from seminaries and college divinity schools accredited by the Association of Theological Schools. (You can look up a school using the list at https://www.ats.edu/member-schools/member-school-list.)

The first meeting with a ministerial candidate might result in the candidate being taken "Under Care," and additional visits are required to continue in the process. For seminary students at Disciples schools, a letter from the COM indicating the Under Care status often entitles the student to a significant discount. This Under Care designation letter from the NC COM also helps the qualifying seminary student apply with the Pension Fund to enter the Student Gift Program with the benefit of \$70/month in pension fund credits donated for free toward Pension Plan retirement—see https://pensionfund.org/uploads/Student-Gift-Program.pdf.

If you are considering ministry, please know that the number of theological students in Universities and Seminaries (in all denominations) has currently declined, so the likelihood of receiving scholarships and grants, especially at "seated" schools (such as Brite Divinity School and Christian Theological Seminary) is better than ever. If you already have a Bachelor's degree and are called to ministry, you can likely afford an M. Div.!

After being taken Under Care, the number and frequency of a candidate's subsequent visits to the COM depends upon the entry level, goal, and progress of the candidate in responding to COM requests. During subsequent meetings, the COM and candidate discuss various reflection papers. The COM can also make additional requests.

Our NC CC Commissioned Ministers are commissioned to a particular role in a particular church for a specified time. They renew their annual standing by sending in an

annual ministry update and returning to speak with the COM when requested, typically once per year (unless the COM specifies otherwise). If a church decides that their commissioned minister should not renew, the church can send notice of this to the COM Chair. If a commissioned minister fails to respond to COM requests, his or her standing expires.

To maintain standing it is important that all NC clergy respond to personalized and general COM requests, take an initial Boundaries course and renew Boundaries every five years, take an initial Racial Equity training and renew Racial Equity every three years, and keep your contact information current with the Regional office.

The COM also wants churches to understand that the only NC CC clergy who currently undergo a background check are those who enter the Search and Call process and have their official profile circulated by the Search and Call office via the Regional Minister. The results of the \$160 background check are included in the prospective minister's profile package. The Regional Minister can provide suggestions about how to interpret minor infractions. (The background check in the search and call system expires every four years.) The NC COM does not conduct a background check or a psychological evaluation, as many other denominations and some of our other Disciples regions do. The NC COM is in the process of drafting a resolution to require that all NC CC clergy have the thorough \$160 background check through our Disciples security partner, and we are researching and receiving input about this. In the meantime, we recommend that hiring churches use the Search and Call system to obtain ministers, and if you chose not to do so conduct background checks through your church insurance company.

- 3. Praesidium will email you your login information
- 4. Once you receive your login information, you may begin your training

<u>Preventing Bullying:</u> Learn what is bullying, why it's a problem, the different types of bullying, how it happens, and how to prevent a child from being bullied.

<u>Hello I'm Sam:</u> Learn the types of molesters and the methods and how they use to manipulate their coworkers, parents, and children-all to meet their own needs. Also, how to spot potentially dangerous interactions between adults and children. *Available in Spanish and French.*



The Year Book and Directory is full of connections between expressions of our Church, by providing an annual snapshot of congregational, regional, and general ministry life. Listing in the Year Book also fulfills congregations' reporting requirements to maintain 501(c)(3) status.

Annual Year Book connects Disciples congregations and ministries (Disciples News Service)

How do we take a snapshot of our denomination? Where can we find some history on our congregation? How many Disciples congregations are there in my area? What do our general ministries do? These questions and more are answered in the annual Year Book and Directory.

The Year Book serves numerous administrative functions, compiling <u>General Board</u> reports and <u>General Assembly</u>resolutions, and serving as the official record of congregations receiving 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status through the Internal Revenue Service.

The data collected during the Year Book reporting process is invaluable for regional and general ministries.

<u>Regions</u> benefit from Year Book data, using the information provided to analyze regional health and vitality. "Transparency in information sharing is one sign of a healthy organization," says Rev. Greg Alexander, regional minister in <u>Kentucky</u> and president of the <u>College of Regional Ministers</u>. "The Year Book and Directory is a resource, when used in full transparency, that helps us have a clearer picture of how and where to focus our best energies in strengthening the whole church. It is the honest look at who and where we are that we need to give ourselves to be more effective witnesses to the Gospel."

<u>General ministries</u> use Year Book data to update their own records and mailing lists of Disciples congregations. Being listed in the Year Book is also a prerequisite for a congregation to participate in many general ministries' programs.

To have their information included in the annual Year Book, congregations must <u>submit a report</u> by March 15. The report can be submitted online, or by emailing or mailing a paper copy of the report to the Year Book office. Congregational statistics published in the Year Book include financial information, membership data, and giving records. The Year Book also includes a Ministers Directory of all clergy ordained and commissioned by the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

The annual Year Book is <u>available for purchase</u> and is prepared and delivered each summer. Physical and digital copies of the 2019 Year Book are available for pre-order now, and copies of the 2018 Year Book are still available.
