



Pentecost Sunday 2019 and New Church Planting

We all know the incredible story of the arrival of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost as found in the second chapter, of the Book of Acts; there is a rush of mighty wind and tongues of fire, and then all that have gathered can suddenly speak and understand the languages of each other. Several then begin to argue that they were all simply drunk, but then Peter addresses the crowd, and when he finished 3,000 people were baptized and joined the church. For several centuries the church experienced tremendous growth, however in recent decades most denominations including our own have seen a great deal of decline.

In 2001 the General Assembly in Kansas City Missouri passed the 20/20 vision plan to plant 1,000 new churches in 1,000 different ways by the year 2020. Since then we have planted almost 1,000 new churches and added more than 60,000 new members. How did we do it?, and more importantly how will we continue to do it?

That's where you and the Pentecost Offering come in. I would like to encourage all of the pastors in the NC Region to do everything possible to build excitement about the Pentecost Offering (June 2nd & June 9th) and to encourage your congregations to be generous; so that we can continue to train new church pastors and their teams, develop new resources, and plant and support new churches. Let's remember that half the money that is raised in our region, remains in our region. And let us remember the initiative to plant new churches does not end with the 2020 vision for the North Carolina Region, or for the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Planting churches is part of who we are and what we do...

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Noted Any Changes in the Last 92 Years?

Charles Crossfield Ware (1886-1974) was serving as our Executive Secretary (today's Regional Minister) when he published *North Carolina Disciples of Christ: A History of Their Rise and Progress, and of Their Contribution to Their General Brotherhood* in 1927. Thanks to the dedicated labors of this avid historian we have a record of the first 82 years of Disciples' history in North Carolina. Now, 92 years later, we've begun the task of updating our Region's history.



To begin the process, in March Regional Minister Bishop Valerie Melvin assembled a group of ministers, who share a long history of service to the Region and a passion

for the Region's history, to form a Regional History Task Group. The working group (pictured below) is identifying sources and materials of value to the recording of our past. With Dr. Ware's past labors, that leaves only 92 years of catching up on the Region's history, but more than a century of the histories of the Assemblies.


Honoring 50 Years of Service!

The Role of Military Chaplains

Military Chaplains are seminary-educated and trained officers appointed by the military to this role and endorsed by the military-endorser of their faith organization.

Chaplains serve in a plethora of environments, cultures and spiritual diversities. I have developed a profound respect for the many men and women that serve in our Armed Forces and especially chaplains. I, too, have served my country for 18+ years of

active duty service. Some serve in hospitals with the strict enforcement of not to proselytize a patient when visiting. The goal in visiting is to uplift the patient, not to win them to your denomination or faith. Chaplains are told to be observant during the visitations, one can determine the patients state of mind.

In times past, I can recall a chaplain telling me their motto was "to minister to their own, facilitate others, and care for all." As clergy, they perform religious services for members of their command. They provide marriage counseling and advise commanders on religious, moral and ethical issues—chaplains are influential and charismatic.

In addition, to their religious roles, they must complete several trainings prior to entering conflict zones. Chaplains transition from preaching in a chapel to preaching on the battlefield. To me, they find hope to share in hopeless situations and challenge soldiers to endure, to remain steadfast and believe that nothing is impossible with God. Before soldiers are deployed into hostile areas, they are given pocket bibles; Psalms 91 was often referred to as a soldiers psalm of protection. I salute and honor the many chaplains for the ministry they provide to our men and women of the armed forces.

Moral Injury may be one of the most significant issues impacting the quality of life for our veterans and others suffering from serious trauma. Moral Injury occurs when a person's fundamental understanding of right and wrong has been violated, and results in profound grief, numbness, or guilt. This summit is bringing together people and professionals from a variety of different fields and backgrounds to discuss the best options for helping people heal from Moral Injury, including our unique approach of K9-centric Post-Traumatic Growth.

Objectives:

- Demonstrate a mastery theoretical and practical definitions of Moral Injury and its relationship to military and civilian trauma.
- Cite strategies and interventions for therapists, health care providers, and faith-based counselors that are applicable to moral injury.
- Explain the similarities and differences between PTSD and Moral Injury.
- Demonstrate an understanding of assessment tools to screen for moral injury for use with members of the military.
- Exhibit insight into various methods for Post-Traumatic growth and recovery.
- Demonstrate an understanding of complementary alternative approaches to helping those who live with Moral Injury.
- Explain the concepts and principles of applying Animal Assisted Intervention as K9-centric Post Traumatic Growth.



Precious Memories

The Rev. Dr. William Chris Hobgood, former general minister and president of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) passed into new life in Christ May 31, 2019. Hobgood was general minister and president from October 2003 to July 2005.

In addition to his work in the general Church, Hobgood was regional minister in Arkansas and the Capital Area and most recently pastor of Bethany Beach Christian Church in Delaware. The author of books such as Welcoming Resistance: A Path to Faithful Ministry, Once and Future Pastor, and Born Apart, Becoming One: Disciples Defeating Racism, Hobgood was a tireless voice speaking up against racism, making that a theme of his term as general minister and president.



"We were so blessed to have him as a leader in our Church. I was blessed to be in proreconciliation/anti-racism training with him several times," said current general minister and president, Rev. Teresa "Terri" Hord Owens. "His leadership in a transitional time called us to faithfulness in our witness as a pro-reconciling anti-racist Church."

Hobgood's daughter, Dr. Laura Hobgood, said "His anti-racism and justice work was always at the heart of his ministry." She noted his long affiliation with the Disciples Center for Public Witness as well as the mission trips his congregation took to assist with rebuilding after Hurricane Katrina.

Born in July of 1936 in Lotumbe in what was then the Republic of Zaire, Hobgood was the son of missionaries. He received his bachelor's degree from Transylvania College (now University) and his divinity degree from the College of the Bible (now Lexington Theological Seminary) while serving several Kentucky congregations in the late 1950s. He earned his doctor of ministry from Lancaster Theological Seminary in 1982.

Dear Disciples,

The NC Commission on Ministry (COM) exists to serve your congregations and clergy in the North Carolina Region. We are all yoked together in a covenant relationship, and we count you among our brothers and sisters in Christ. As a part of this relationship, we want to highlight a powerful resource that helps congregations in a time of great need: the Search & Call process provided by the General church of our denomination.

The work of the COM gives us a unique perspective into the particular callings of ordained and commissioned ministers. This allows us to see that congregations who fully utilize the Search & Call system in cooperation with your Regional Minister, Bishop Valerie Melvin, have the smoothest transitions and tend to find great strength in the process. Search & Call connects congregations to a diverse pool of ministers called to the gospel of Jesus Christ. We believe that Search & Call can provide every congregation with the greatest freedom and autonomy in a search process. By breaking down geographic and demographic barriers, it also frees congregations to connect with bright, capable, and committed ministers whom they may never find through other local connections.

Also, with all the excitement that selecting a new minister brings, it can be easy for congregations to overlook the kind of verification and accountability that is at the foundation of Search & Call; including background checks, input from references, education and experience information, and written statements about familiarity with the values of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and depth of spiritual character. With Search & Call, a search team can first meet many ministers via profile, which is a valuable time saver. This up-front information helps limit the possibility of worst-case scenarios and gives the church a regional support system in the event that a selection turns out not to be a perfect match. In a new relationship, no one ever wants to think about the worst possibilities in another person, particularly clergy, which is why Search & Call provides such an invaluable service by addressing those concerns before the relationship even begins.

Whether your church is in transition, has recently completed a ministerial search, or cannot imagine having a different pastor any time soon, as your servants we want to bear witness to the fruit of churches who fully use the Search & Call process and advise you that we have insight into some of the risks of those who do not. If a church does not follow this recommendation and does not use the Search & Call process, we encourage the church leaders to require their minister to meet with the Commission on Ministry in an effort to gain Standing, Commissioning, or Ordination as a Disciples pastor. We can help, and we share this letter only with the hope that all of our congregations grow in strength as we fulfill our calling in serving God with the good news of Jesus, our risen and ascended Lord.


